Thank you for helping us continue to show the world such transformational love in 2025, and beyond.

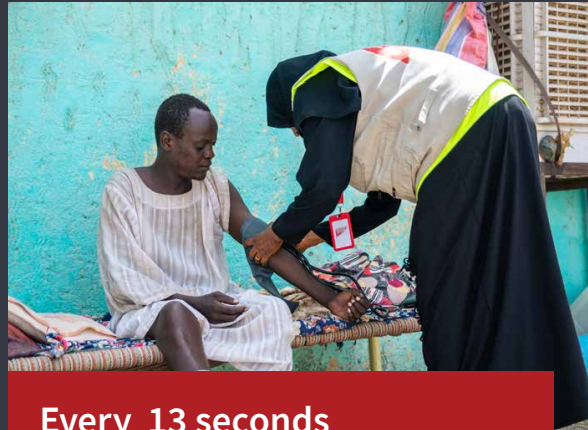

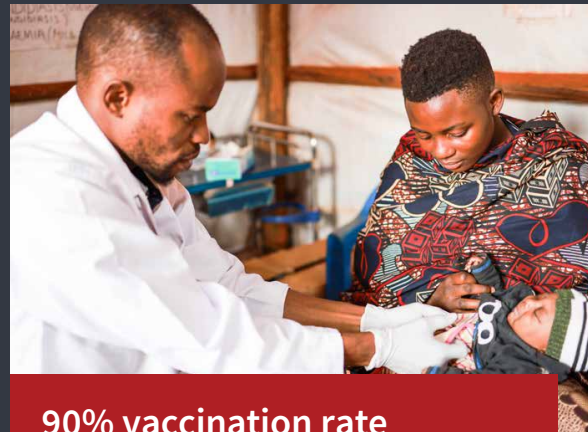

Transformation



Janeth

TANZANIA | EQUIPPING



Medical Teams equips people with the tools they need to achieve both physical and mental well-being. When Janeth faced a new HIV diagnosis, a stressful pregnancy, and domestic abuse, you helped equip her with HIV medication, prenatal care, and counseling. With each tool she received, Janeth discovered the path out of suffering and toward healing.

When Janeth arrived at the Medical Teams International clinic in the Nyarugusu refugee camp in Tanzania for her first antenatal visit, we discovered that Janeth and her partner were both HIV-positive. “I was shocked,” Janeth says. “I felt as though life had lost its purpose.”

While Janeth struggled to accept her results, her partner began verbally abusing her. He hurled insults and accusations of infidelity at her and finally walked out and left her behind.

In an incredible show of strength and resilience, Janeth chose to equip herself with the tools she needed to care for herself during pregnancy. The clinic established antiretroviral therapy medication for Janeth. When they observed that her abdomen was measuring larger than normal for her gestational age, they performed an ultrasound that confirmed she was carrying twins. The clinic followed up with home visits, counseling, and encouragement to help Janeth stay strong for herself and her unborn babies. Your support equipped her for success, and both babies were born healthy.

Janeth is an extraordinary woman, whose radiant smile reflects the beauty and strength in her heart. She was delighted to see Medical Teams showing genuine interest in her story, and she found comfort in having someone truly understand and listen to her. “I cannot imagine going through everything I’ve experienced without the constant help of Medical Teams,” she says.

Janeth’s path was overshadowed by conflict and domestic abuse. “My husband left me at the hospital after we were given our HIV results, cursing, and insulting me without caring for my condition. He harassed me in front of everyone and left. When I returned home, the cycle of domestic abuse continued,” she shared. “I am thankful to God that he was forced by the court to agree to separate.” Now, Janeth can raise her new twins in peace and safety.

Janeth expressed her gratitude to God for the presence of a Medical Teams clinic in the refugee camp. She endured unimaginable hardships, but receiving loving care and the tools she needed helped her not feel alone. “It brings me a sense of relief knowing that I am the only one infected among myself and my children,” she says. “I decided to prioritize my health and well-being for the sake of my children. I am now committed to following the doctor’s advice to maintain good health.”

Mazahir

SUDAN | EMPOWERING



We want to empower communities to thrive by working closely with volunteers who can teach, treat, and care for their neighbors. Mazahir was empowered to use her professional skills as a nurse to support the other refugees in her camp. By providing education and medical care to others in need, she was able to turn her own personal suffering into purpose.

When civil war erupted in Sudan, Mazahir Aldooma was living in Khartoum working as a nurse. As bombs exploded and military attacks raged near her home, Mazahir, her husband Aymen, and her daughter Aseel fled Khartoum and traveled through Gezira to Gedaref. During the family's journey, Mazahir lost the critical certificates that allowed her to work as a nurse – not only had she lost her home, but also her profession.

Five months into the country's civil war, Medical Teams established a clinic to serve the displaced and war-torn people of Sudan. Mazahir contacted someone in Khartoum who was able to help her get new nursing certificates so she could resume doing what she loved most, caring for others.

Mazahir started working with Medical Teams as a community health worker, conducting health awareness sessions to help improve people's hygiene and mental health. "I felt good because I was able to support people and help them. But still, I felt that I can do more and help more." Amid her own personal crisis, being able to engage in meaningful work empowered Mazahir to better the lives of those around her.

When an acute diarrhea outbreak erupted, Medical Teams intervened with emergency rehydration services, and Mazahir was once again able to put her nursing skills to use.

Working with Medical Teams was a lifeline for Mazahir, both professionally and personally. "Without joining and working for Medical Teams, I think life would be very hard," Mazahir says. "I would be struggling to find a job and support my family."

Mazahir is hopeful that the Sudanese civil war will end soon, so people will be able to return to their homes. She looks forward to continuing her nursing career and finding new opportunities to help. "Stay connected to your dreams and keep fighting for the best," she says. "Keep pushing forward, and never stop dreaming."

Mykhailo

UKRAINE | HEALING



The core of our mission is to heal our brothers and sisters through life-saving medical care. Before Medical Teams arrived at his door, Mykhailo had given up on ever getting relief from his physical suffering. Now, he has received loving, compassionate medical care that is healing both body and spirit.

Mykhailo spent most of his life living in the village of Sukhanove, in southern Ukraine. He worked as a combine operator, and Mykhailo and his wife raised two sons there.

Mykhailo had been ill for some time when Russia attacked Ukraine in February 2022. “Losing the ability to work made me feel even more powerless,” Mykhailo says. “Later, the war took my relatives, leaving me alone and without support during these difficult times.”

Living under the constant threat of shelling and bombings for months, each of Mykhailo’s days was a struggle for survival. His heart would race “as if it wanted to leap out of my chest,” and he was anxious and fearful about the future.

Thankfully, Medical Teams came to Sukhanove and knocked on Mykhailo’s door bringing the most powerful gift of all – the ability to heal. They brought medical knowledge and supplies coupled with hope, support, and warmth. “Medical Teams turned out to be my true heroes in the fight against my illness,” Mykhailo says. “Their unwavering hands and warm demeanor worked wonders, bringing me faith and hope for recovery.”

Medical Teams gave Mykhailo the medicine and support he needed to improve his health. Now, he receives regular check-ups from the Medical Teams staff, ensuring that his healing journey continues. “Every moment has become more valuable and vibrant, as I now understand how important it is to be healthy and live life to the fullest,” he says. “Thanks to Medical Teams, I’ve been given a second chance at life, and I’m not going to waste it. I am grateful for every new day and every breath I can take freely and without hindrance.”

While Mykhailo still experiences the pain and suffering brought on by the war, he is hopeful that the war will end and that the Ukrainian towns and villages that have been destroyed will be restored. “My hopes are rooted in my faith in human kindness and a collective effort to build a future where peace and harmony prevail above all.”

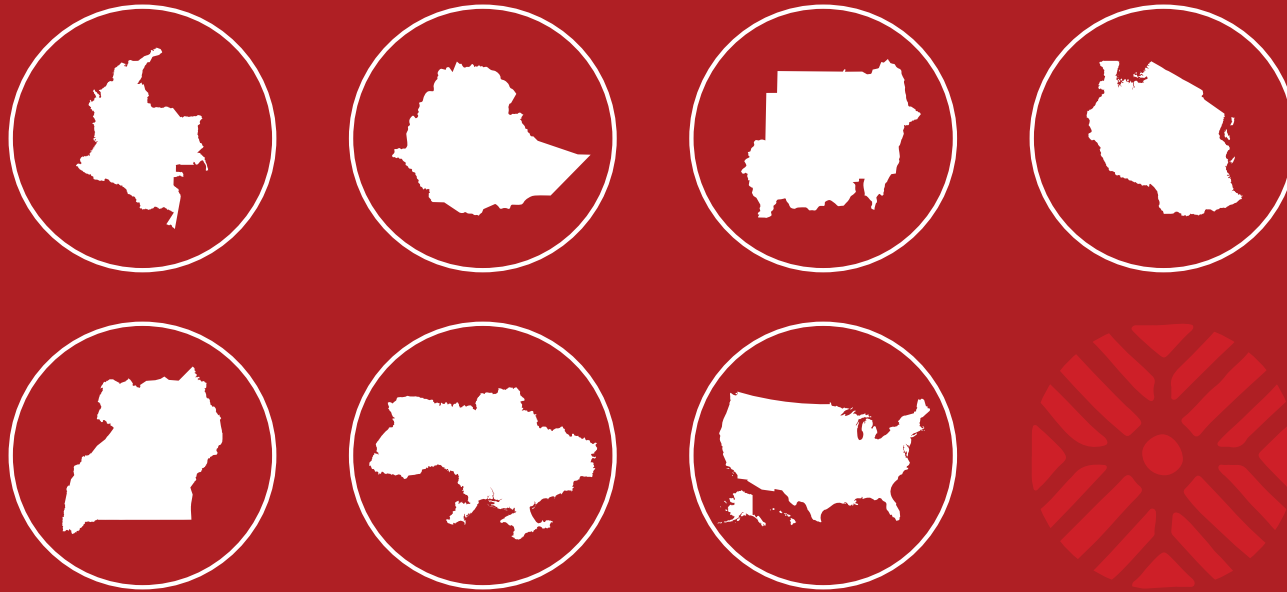

Colombia



Driving Quality Care for Migrants and Host Communities in Colombia

In 2024, Medical Teams partnered with 4 Colombian health care facilities to strengthen the health systems that migrants and host communities alike depend on. The bold approach centered around improving the quality of medical services. Medical and administrative staff at each hospital were asked to identify quality issues they wanted to focus on in hopes of implementing more patient-centered approaches to care.

One key issue identified was the need to improve the experience for mothers giving birth at the hospital. Before this initiative, companions were not allowed to accompany patients in labor onto the ward. By introducing new evidence-based interventions to ensure childbirth was more respectful and supported, quality improvement actions took root. For example, hospitals introduced patient-centered birthing plans, non-drug pain management options, and policies allowing a support person during childbirth. As a result, patients reported significantly improved experiences during labor and delivery. For the first time, they could choose to be accompanied by a loved one during labor.

Recognizing the vulnerabilities migrants face, the project also focused on building systems that protect survivors of sexual violence. Your support helped develop a comprehensive Sexual Violence Response initiative, which included training emergency staff, improving forensic evidence protocols, ensuring 24/7 access to psychological services, and ensuring every survivor received respectful and holistic support.

These changes resulted in a transformational increase in the quality of care. The success of this pilot project in Colombia shows that real, lasting change happens when innovation is paired with generous support from our community. Your support allowed us to spark change in knowledge, attitude, and practices, working hand-in-hand with local health leaders to ensure sustainability. Thank you for helping us build stronger, more resilient healthcare systems to better meet the needs of both migrants and host communities in Colombia.

Ethiopia



Against All Odds: How a Dedicated Team Is Rebuilding the Health System in Ethiopia

Over the past 4 years, Ethiopia's health infrastructure has suffered significant setbacks due to damage, looting, supply chain disruptions, and the loss of healthcare workers as people have fled from the internal conflict. Capacity was further strained as conflict erupted in neighboring Sudan, causing more than 100,000 people to flee across the border into Ethiopia.

In hospitals and clinics that were left in ruins, our teams have been working to restore services by partnering with local staff, offering training, rehabilitating facilities, and supplying medicines and equipment. The goal is not only to meet urgent needs, but to leave behind stronger systems and more resilient communities.

In 2024, your support helped us take great strides toward that goal. In Assosa, near the border with Sudan, your generosity helped construct a brand-new health center. Built in partnership with UNHCR in just 3 months, this is the first health center in the area and will serve approximately 45,000 refugees and members of the host community who previously had no access to care. The facility offers 24/7 comprehensive primary healthcare and works with the local hospital to ensure patients receive timely referrals for specialized services like maternal care, malnutrition treatment, vaccinations, and mental health support.

The impact of this new health center reaches far beyond the clinic walls. Your support also helped train and deploy 135 community health volunteers and 66 skilled professionals who provide frontline care, conduct disease surveillance and nutrition screening, and offer public health education in the surrounding community. Where health systems have collapsed, you are helping Medical Teams create sustainable systems and walk alongside communities as they rebuild.

Sudan



Strength in Scarcity: Going the Last Mile to Reach the Most Vulnerable in Sudan

The war that broke out in Sudan in April 2023 has resulted in the world's largest ongoing humanitarian crisis. At the end of 2024, there were 10.1 million internally displaced persons (IDPs) across Sudan. Over 25 million people are experiencing high levels of food insecurity, and famine conditions are spreading. Destroyed health facilities, inflation, and shortages of health and nutrition supplies have only worsened the crisis across the country.

Your support in 2024 allowed Medical Teams to level up our response to this overwhelming need. Initially serving only 200,000 people, our teams were serving more than 1.2 million across 12 refugee camps—covering 60% of all camps in Sudan—by the end of 2024. Thanks to your generosity, Medical Teams is now the lead health and nutrition partner in these areas, delivering essential care where few others can operate.

We are grateful for the extraordinary courage of our team in Sudan, delivering care in regions where safety is not a given, supplies are limited, and basic needs like food, clean water, and electricity are scarce. In the face of these challenges, your support allows us to keep primary health centers running and ensures that displaced communities continue to receive lifesaving care.

Tanzania



Responding with Resolve: Strengthening Maternal Health in Tanzania

In Tanzania's refugee camps where Medical Teams operates, maternal and newborn care stands as a bright spot in an often-challenging health landscape. In 2024, you helped support 2,979 women during labor and delivery, with 98% of births in our service areas taking place in health facilities staffed by skilled attendants.

When complications arise during childbirth, access to a timely blood transfusion can mean the difference between life and death. Unfortunately, blood shortages are common, and the right type is not always available locally. In one recent tragic case, the nearest compatible blood was over an hour away, a delay that proved fatal.

Your support helped develop strategies to prevent future tragedies like this one. Our team launched a targeted blood donation campaign and developed a special blood type register, allowing them to identify and track individuals with rare blood types in the community. 16 people donated, and 7 were registered with special blood types, including 2 with rare profiles. Collaborations with local churches further enhanced efforts, resulting in the collection of 30 additional units of blood.

This initiative also addressed ways to reduce the demand for the precious units of blood available. The prevalence of malaria was driving demand, as severe cases often lead to anemia, necessitating blood transfusions. In collaboration with other health partners, the team used preventive measures like spraying insecticide on the walls and ceilings of people's homes, coupled with the distribution of long-lasting insecticide-treated mosquito nets. The intervention was overwhelmingly successful. In areas where homes were sprayed and mosquito nets distributed, malaria cases dropped to below 10% (compared to 43% in areas without these interventions).

Thanks to your support, our team expanded blood donation networks, registered rare donors, educated communities, and strengthened our readiness to respond to crises. These changes will ensure that more people receive timely, life-saving care in Tanzania.

Uganda



Responding in Real Time: Outbreak Containment & Community Preparedness in Uganda

In 2024, Medical Teams' staff across Uganda responded to a year of extraordinary health challenges—marked by overlapping disease outbreaks, increasing displacement, and growing pressure on an already strained health system. The country received almost 100,000 new refugees, mainly from Sudan, South Sudan, and the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC). These new arrivals, seeking safety from ongoing conflicts and instability in their home countries, brought with them increased health risks that demanded swift, coordinated responses from Medical Teams and local health authorities.

When a measles outbreak prompted immediate action in the Nakivale refugee settlement, Medical Teams launched an emergency vaccination campaign, reaching over 34,000 children. In addition, the team supported a Yellow Fever immunization campaign in northern Uganda that reached over 100,000 people. Your support helped build a shield of protection in record time.

When Mpox emerged across multiple refugee settlements, our teams responded by deploying health screeners to border points to catch cases early. Over 20 alerts were investigated and managed, keeping transmission to a minimum, with 0 deaths recorded. In another site, our teams managed 13 cholera cases without a single life lost. Even in the face of Anthrax, rapid intervention helped contain the threat.

But the work didn't stop at treatment—we trained nearly 300 community volunteers and over 290 frontline health workers to detect and report diseases early. We held community dialogues, public awareness campaigns and radio programs to help spread accurate information and reduce stigma. These efforts strengthened district-level surveillance and reinforced coordination with health authorities.

With disease outbreaks unfolding alongside existing demands for daily health services, your support empowered our teams in Uganda to be prepared, not just to respond. Thank you for helping ensure that infectious diseases didn't just stop at the clinic door—they were intercepted before they could spread across borders and through communities.

Ukraine



Care Where it's Needed Most: Mobile Medical Teams on the Frontlines

When war erupted across Ukraine in February 2022, millions of lives were uprooted overnight. Families fled, homes were destroyed, and healthcare systems crumbled under the weight of relentless conflict. For those who stayed behind—particularly the elderly living near the frontlines—access to even basic medical care became nearly impossible.

Thanks to your generosity, our Mobile Medical Teams are equipped to meet the complex needs of Ukrainians. Non-communicable diseases (NCDs) like diabetes, heart disease, and hypertension have worsened as services have collapsed. Meanwhile, the mental health toll of war continues to deepen: nearly half of Ukrainians now report mental health concerns as their most pressing health issue, and 44% of children show signs of post-traumatic stress.

Each team provides medical consultations, disease management support, medication referrals, and follow-up care. We also embed trained mental health professionals into every team who offered psychological first aid, one-on-one counseling, and group therapy sessions to over 1,900 people in 2024. This holistic approach allows us to restore both physical health and dignity for those left behind.

During one visit to a frontline village, our team met Mykhailo, an 80-year-old widower living alone after his family were killed in the war. After becoming ill, and with no family left to help care for him, his situation quickly deteriorated.

“When doctors, nurses, social workers and psychologists started coming to my home, my heart was warmed by an unexpected sense of hope. It felt like a dream—I couldn’t believe it was really happening. The medical teams turned out to be my true heroes in the fight against my illness.”

In a conflict that too often leaves the most vulnerable behind, your support ensured that quality healthcare and human connection remained within reach for those living on the frontlines.

A Tale of Two Deserts: Bringing Dental Care to Those Who Need it Most

The Southern Oregon desert is captivating and beautiful. Driving through the town of Burns on the way to the Steens Mountains conjures feelings of freedom and majesty, but most people who pass through are completely unaware that they are also in another kind of desert—a “dental care desert.”

No dentist in Burns accepts Medicaid. The closest town where low-income or uninsured people can access any kind of oral health care is 140 miles away. Securing an appointment for care means a waiting period of at least 8 months before they can see a dentist.

Nested in these 2 deserts is the Burns Paiute Tribe, one of Oregon’s 9 tribal nations. Financial barriers coupled with geographic barriers make preventative dental care an unaffordable luxury. These are some of the people we were able to reach with dental care this year thanks to your support.

Thanks to your generosity in 2024, our Care & Connect mobile dental team held 5 dental clinics in Burns, serving 78 patients. Of these, 51 were tribal members and 27 were residents who came to the clinics from all over Harney County.

One patient works locally at a full-time job. She came to the clinic on her lunch break, holding her hand to her face and asking if she could see a dentist. As our dentist began the exam, the woman explained that she had finally saved enough to make an appointment with the dentist in Bend when the community was hit with a 100-year flood. Her house had serious water damage that took all her savings for dental care. Our dental team took nearly 2 hours with her to ensure that her oral health needs were addressed, and she left the van pain-free, transformed by loving, accessible health care.

In 2024 alone, US Programs provided free dental care and health screenings to over 12,000 people in 28 counties across Oregon and Washington. Each visit is a step toward equity in a system that too often overlooks those with the greatest need.

1979

When Ron Post saw the cruelty of the Cambodian Killing Fields on the nightly news, he was struck with divine inspiration. In just 2 weeks, he was flying alongside a team of doctors to care for refugees in Thailand.

1991 / 1992

You opened your hearts to the Kurdish people in Iraq when they were threatened by Saddam Hussein's army. You helped us send \$30 million dollars in medical supplies and serve 400 patients a day in a harsh climate.

1999

You cared for Kosovar families in Albania when they settled in makeshift refugee camps after being forced to leave home to avoid violence.

2004

Your partnership helped launch our Uganda program, now in its 20th year, to help care for people affected by the violence of the Lord's Resistance Army insurgency. Since then, you've helped millions of people in Uganda.

1985

When the worst famine in modern history struck Ethiopia, you helped send more than \$1 million dollars in supplies and equipment alongside a team of volunteer doctors to help heal families.

1993

As the Yugoslav wars forced more than 2 million people to abandon their homes, you helped serve and comfort Croatian and Bosnian refugees.

2000

When the worst flooding in 50 years overwhelmed Mozambique, your generosity cared for Africans who had lost everything to the flood waters.

2005

You responded quickly to the devastation left in the wake of Hurricane Katrina, becoming some of the first to help people by sending critical supplies and hope to survivors of the unforgettable disaster.

1986

Your generosity helped establish the first community center in a dump outside Mexico City, which began decades of work bringing medical care to people in poverty in Mexico and Central America.

1994

After the genocide in Rwanda, you jumped into action to help care for people affected by the genocide and violence of the Rwandan Civil War.

2001

As our nation mourned the devastating attack on 9/11, you sent counseling and comfort to the shocked survivors and first responders to New York City.

2007

Flooding in Mexico brought the threat of cholera, hepatitis, and dengue fever when 70% of the country was underwater. You stopped the outbreak of diseases through your generosity.

1989

Donors like you helped our Pacific Northwest neighbors when our mobile dental program began! Staffed by volunteers, these mobile clinics reached rural areas and served those without other access to dental care.

1997

Your gifts immediately went to work helping children in orphanages in Moldova and Romania. You provided medical supplies, corrective surgeries, and trained nurses in infant care through the late 90s.

2003

You showed extraordinary compassion to people in Afghanistan who were displaced by war, sending medical care and support to those who had lost everything.

2008

In Guatemala, you helped pioneer an innovative program that improved community health that empowered indigenous communities struggling with high respiratory illness rates and maternal and child mortality.

2014

With courage and grace, you responded to the Ebola outbreak in western Africa by using community health prevention tactics that stopped the spread of the virus.

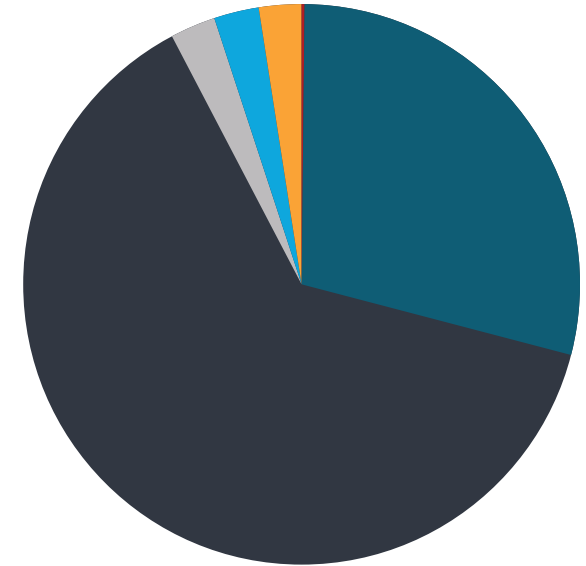
